Introduction:

This class is an introductory class to interior design. Please come to class prepared to take notes and work.

Course Description

This course illustrates past trends, current trends, future trends and market forecasts in the field of interior design. Areas to be addressed include environmental concerns affecting living environments as well as resources for design materials. Off-site visits are an integral part of the course.

Assessed Degree Program Learning Outcome: To describe a wide range of global, social and cultural points of view and apply various perspectives to analyze human behavior. Assessment will be recorded based on the student's response paper after the off-site visit and presentations.

Learning Outcomes and Objectives

- 1. Examine manufacturers of flooring, wall coverings, textiles, furniture, lighting, architectural treatments, and accessories.
 - a. Collect samples, catalogs or other information that reflects contemporary trends in interior architecture and design through visits to local vendors of interior architecture and design products.
 - b. Document information regarding the manufacturers of interior architecture and design products.
- 2. Examine current trends, market forecasts and political issues affecting the fulfillment of individual housing needs and choices
 - a. Observe design tends through visits to local model homes.
 - b. Research housing news on the internet to gain insight into political and economic issues related to housing.
- 3. Analyze futuristic trends in architecture and interiors.
 - a. Study the Pantone color forecast discussed in class.
 - b. Select one of the projected color trends for further research.
 - c. Develop a visual presentation that illustrates one of the color trends as used in interior spaces.
 - d. Portray the color trend through images of furniture, fixtures, interior spaces and textiles.
 - e. Develop an oral presentation to support the visual presentation.
- 4. Analyze environmental concerns affecting future living environments.
 - a. Define sustainable design.
 - b. Name benefits of sustainable building practices.
 - c. Identify major organizations and certifications related to sustainable design.
 - d. Develop a visual presentation on a sustainable interior.

- e. Develop an oral presentation to support the visual presentation.
- f. Analyze a sustainable interior space for its use of the 5 elements of design Space, Line, Form, Color, and Texture.
- g. Evaluate the function, structure and materials, and aesthetics of the interior space.
- h. Indicate source information on the green materials used in the space.
- i. Provide examples of the materials on the presentation board.

5. Summarize the various careers in Interior Design and the professional organizations affiliated with them.

- a. Identify four major interior design professional organizations.
- b. Name three interior design career options.
- c. Identify areas of influence common to interior design careers.
- d. Develop a 10-minute PowerPoint presentation on Interior Design Careers.
- e. Develop an oral presentation to support the visual presentation.
- f. Research various interior design careers and professional design organizations.
- g. Highlight major aspects of a career and a design organization with real world examples.
- h. Relate the career and professional organization to one another.
- i. Compose a 1-page essay describing what your field of interest is in Interior Design.

Assessment of Learning Outcomes: Learning outcomes are determined by measuring the ability of each student to retain the learning outcomes of the course. Performance-based methods, such as completion a paper will determine the final grade on this course.
